Erez Tadmor Director/Co-Writer

Born in Israel in 1974. Erez Tadmor is a writer and director from Tel-Aviv. Israel. He graduated from Camera Obscura Film School in Tel Aviv. His first short *Moosh* won over 40 international film festivals awards including: World Fest in Houston, Palm Springs and many more. His short Strangers (with Guy Nattiv), drama for 20th Century Fox Searchlight, was awarded the online short competition at Sundance Film Festival in 2004 and also went to the Berlin Film Festival competition. Another short Offside won for best short

film in the Manhattan International Short Film Festival in 2006. His first feature Strangers, based on the short, was accepted to the Sundance World Cinema Dramatic Competition in 2007.

A Matter of Size was his second movie, directed with Sharon Maymon, about the coming out of the closet of fat people and about their ability to accept and relate to their body through the world of sumo; it won an Audience Award at Karlovy Vary International Film Festival in 2009, Grand Prix & Special Jury Award at Alpe d'Huez International Comedy Film Festival, and Best Comedy at Traverse City Film Festival. In 2014, Tamador made Magic Men (again with Guy Nattiv), which won Best Actor in the Ophir Awards (Israeli Oscar). In 2015, he made Wounded Land, which won Best Director and Best Actor in the Ophir Awards.

From the Director

In the face of clerics, women are very vulnerable and exposed. As in Moliere's *Tartuffe*, the phenomenon also exists in Judaism. When a woman trusts a rabbi, who takes advantage of the situation to sexually exploit her, she has no defense mechanisms. In an ultra-Orthodox religious environment, the chances for this to happen are the highest. These cases raise doubts about obtaining religious authority. It is important for me to raise this issue on the agenda, and to prevent such cases in the future. This difficult conflict raises theological questions and puts the religious faith to the test. The film is based on real cases that happened, and the clergy's dealing with the phenomenon. When the religious mentality and faith conflict with the love of a man and a woman - I want to believe that love wins.



Rabbi Mordechai Vardi Writer/Director

Mordechai Vardi graduated with a Master's degree in Film and Television from Tel Aviv University. He is an Israeli writer-director best known for his work on documentaries and feature films. He is a peace activist and a member of the "ROOTS" organization, on which he made a documentary film, The Field, and was the head of the Screenwriting department at the Ma'aleh Film School for 20 years. He currently serves as the rabbi of Kibbutz Rosh Zurim, and also serves as an artistic advisor to film funds in Israel. His recent. documentary, *Marry Me However*, has resonated and is participating in many festivals around the world, including the 2023 Mayerson JCC Jewish & Israeli Film Festival.

Set in Poland during the German occupation, 19-year-old Irena Gut is promoted to housekeeper in the home of a highlyrespected Nazi officer when she finds out that the Jewish ghetto is about to be liquidated. Irena uses her wit, humor, and courage to hide 12 Jews, concealing them in the midst of countless obstacles. Through the eyes of a strong-willed woman comes the remarkable true story of Irena Gut Opdyke and the triumphs of the human spirit over devastating tragedy.

The Story of Irena's Vow

Inspired by the true story of Irena Gut, acclaimed Canadian Academy Award nominated screenwriter Dan Gordon wrote a play based on her life. *Irena's Vow* debuted off-Broadway in 2009, to rave reviews.

The play has reached audiences all over the United States, Canada and Israel. With Dan Gordon's illustrious screenwriting career, it was only a matter of time before he decided to adapt his play into a feature film. Such an important and international story felt like a natural fit for the screen.

Director Louise Archambault sheds light about the importance of the film: "Irena's story is universal and still topical today. More than ever, considering all the recent political, religious and racial wars throughout the world, including the #MeToo movement, we need inspiring truthbased stories like this one, extending a hand to others, regardless of their religion, culture or race."

Screenwriter Dan Gordon ties the story to current events: "It is so much more relevant today than it was ten years ago when I wrote it. That evil, which I think is a real living presence, I think it's like a cancer. I don't think it's ever gone. I think it's dormant [...] now you see what's happening in Ukraine with Russia, that cancer is being reactivated and it's unfortunately a catching cancer. It's airborne. So the relevance is more so today than when I wrote it, by a factor of a thousand."

About Production

Irena's Vow was shot across Poland, including Warsaw and Lubin, in just 29 days.

Director of Photography, Paul Sarossy says this about his time in Poland: "It's an incredible experience working here in Poland with the local team in this amazing place. These locations have such incredible visual potential [...] And on top of that, in a place that is so close to where this story actually took place [...] there's something kind of precious about that."



Louise ArchambaultDirector

Screenwriter and director. Louise Archambault made her debut with the internationally acclaimed film Atomic Saké. winning prizes such as the Jutra for Best Short Film. Her first feature film Familia gained many international sales and awards such as Best Canadian First Feature Film at TIFF. In addition to directing episodes of the TV series La Galère (2013), Nouvelle Adresse (2014), broadcast on Radio-Canada, and This Life (2015) for CBC, Louise launched her second film Gabrielle at the Locarno International Film Festival (Audience Award). In 2019, L Pleuvait Des Oiseaux (And the Birds Rained Down) premiered at TIFF and won various awards such as Best International Feature at the Göteborg Film Festival. Her film Merci Pour Tout (Thanks for Everything) was released December 25, 2019. These films both got considerable box office, ranking respectively second and third position in Canada. Louise just finished shooting the TV series Survivre À Ses Enfants, a comedy for Radio-Canada.





P-51 fighter pilot Jerry Yellin flew combat missions on Iwo Jima and over Japan, including the last combat mission of World War II. As he confronts his decades-old fear and hatred, Yellin overcomes his PTSD as he was forced to face his enemy once again when his youngest son moved to Japan and married the daughter of a Kamikaze pilot. This documentary tells the story of Jerry's reconciliation with the enemy and healing from the wounds of war.

About Jerry Yellin

Jerome "Jerry" Yellin (February 15, 1924 – December 21, 2017) was a United States Army Air Forces World War II fighter pilot who fought in the Battle of Iwo Jima and who flew 19 Very Long Range (VLR) combat missions over Japan. He has been credited with flying the final combat mission of World War II in a North American P-51 Mustang against a military airfield near Tokyo on August 14, 1945. In his later years, he became well known for his reconciliation with the Japanese and for his work in helping veterans with posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD). He was the author of four books, including Jerry's Last Mission (originally entitled *Of War and* Weddings), an autobiography. On January 29, 2014, Texas Governor Rick Perry honored Yellin's military service and commitment to help veterans by making him an honorary Texan.



Louisa Merino Director/Writer/Producer


Louisa studied documentary filmmaking at the New York Film Academy where her thesis film. Lifeline, attracted subjects that ranged from an Oscar-winning

writer and director team, to Harry Potter-star Daniel Radcliffe, Soon after graduating, she won a 6,000 Euro grant through an international film contest and became the representative of the US, making a film about sustainability in New York City. In this project, she was mentored by Oscar-winning director Davis Guggenheim. Her film Families like Me was selected as part of Mexico's Women in Film and Television showcase for 2013. among other festivals worldwide; and her film *Lifeline* was part of the official selection of the Seattle Lesbian and Gav Film Festival for 2013. Louisa taught film editing in the Metropolitan Museum of Art's "Art and Film" course in New York City and has worked with the David Lynch Foundation for the past ten years as Senior Editor, Story Producer and Consultant.

Avinoam and Barak, father and son from a Kibbutz near Gaza strip, are each facing another round of combat in their own way. While Avinoam insists on continuing his routine and his work in the field, Barak finds it difficult to close his eyes and continue as usual. One night, Barak reaches a boiling point and Avinoam is forced to absorb the flames.

Yahav Winner's final film is a poignant meditation on empathy across borders, as told through the eyes of a young man living in a Kibbutz on the Gaza border, whose compassion for his neighbors on the other side of the fence sets him apart from his family and community.

From the Director

I was born in Kibbutz Kfar Gaza in 1986. The eldest son of two urban parents who chose to come to Kibbutz to fulfill the dream of a house with a garden. My father, a handsome, strong and tough man, decided to give me the name Yahav - security, hope. From the moment I was born, I felt the yoke of God on my shoulders, because in my head there were dreams, reflections and high sensitivities that made me crv from almost every situation. I grew up in the Kibbutz as an alpha male blessed with blue eyes and an athletic body, one who was prophesied to be an elite officer or even, if he really succeeded, a pilot. But I, for as long as I can remember, have felt split. A boy who fails to grow up. Trying to be serious and concentrate on the "important" things in life like cars, business and money, but I couldn't, Instead, I grabbed a guitar and sang. Or I told stories. Life in the Kibbutz as a child I remember as heaven on earth: green lawns, a pool, paths you can walk on barefoot. I only remember the nights as scary. I sleep in a bunk bed with my little brother under me, unable to fall asleep because of the sounds of the muezzin coming from Gaza. My father was angry with me for not falling asleep. In 2006. Paradise started to become less magical. Israel-Gaza relations began to heat up and souvenirs from Gaza in the shape of exploding pipes began to fall on the Kibbutz. One day, an exploding pipe fell on my neighbor Jimmy, my best friend's father, and I was the first to see him.

This event carved a hole in my heart and from that moment I embarked on a path from which the return was long. Shortly after the incident, I left the army on my own accord. My father, my beacon, took it very hard. His child went crazv, and the whole Kibbutz knew. Chronic knee pain began to develop for him. But instead of being angry with me, he internalized it and did an act of his that I will cherish to this day - he took me to work with him in the field. so that I would be close to him. We would drive in silence, father and son on the tractor, yellow wheat fields to our left, Gaza to our right. We didn't talk much, but in those days it was a lifeline for me. He was my hero. I remember that somewhere I developed an awareness of wars, as absurd as they are but inevitable. The tanks and jeeps that used to travel in our fields, trampling the farmers' work without recognition because everything is kosher when it comes to a military operation, would travel on the way to small and cunning Gaza. "to show them what it is" and who knows what kind of life they will harvest there. There were days when I couldn't digest the thought that whole families were being wiped out three kilometers from me and we have another cooking show on TV. In my film, I try to capture a tragic and human triangle of the therapist, the patient and the absurd. My father the therapist. I - the patient and the impossible, and endless situation of the envelope and the Gaza Strip - the absurdity.





Yahav Winner, z"l Director/Writer

Yahav Winner graduated from the Nissan Nativ Acting Studio in 2014. He was also a graduate of the film department at Minshar School of Art. In 2020, Winner and his wife, Shayle Atary, collaborated on Neurim, a short film that Winner produced and was later screened at the Cannes Film Festival's Cinefoundation. As he processed his own trauma, Winner wrote and directed *The Boy.* Winner was working on a feature film about Kibbutz stories before his death.

Shaylee Atary Editor

Shaylee Atary is a graduate of the Nissan Nativ Tel Aviv Acting Studio and Ruth Dytches Acting for Camera school. Shaylee specializes in video editing and gradually paves her way as a filmmaker in the world of cinema. Shaylee Atary is known for Neurim (2020), Single Light (2023) and Johnny and the Knights of Galilee (2015).

IN MEMORY: On Saturday, October 7, 2023, in the early morning, Hamas terrorists burst into Yahav's family bedroom in Kibbutz Kfar Aza in the south of Israel. Yahav tried with all his strength to block the terrorists, allowing his wife, Shaylee, and their one-month-old daughter, Shaya, to escape. Shortly afterward, Yahav was murdered in cold blood. Shaylee defended baby Shaya, with no food or water, for 27 hours until they were rescued.



I realized there was a demand for a movie about this storied vacation land that so many people recall fondly.



Lex GillespieDirector

Lex Gillespie is a three-time Peabody Award winner and the shared winner of a silver baton from the duPont-Columbia Journalism Awards at New York's Columbia School of Journalism. For the past 25 years, he's produced documentaries on music, history, culture and the arts. His credits include Let the Good Times Roll. a 26-hour history of African-American music from the blues to Motown: Songs in the Wind, the story of the indigenous music of the Andes Mountains; and Seoul House, about a hip hop opera set in a Korean mom-and-pop corner store in Washington, DC.



Jennifer Caplan Speaker

Jennifer Caplan is the Jewish Foundation of Cincinnati Chair in Judaic Studies at the University of Cincinnati. She received her PhD in religious studies from Syracuse University after a dual BA in religion and theatre studies from Welleslev College and an MTS from Harvard Divinity School. Her first book, Funny, You Don't Look Funny: Judaism and Humor from the Silent Generation to Millennials was published by Wayne State University Press in 2023. She is currently working on her new book, Unmasked: Judaism in DC and Marvel. She has published widely on topics about Judaism and popular culture.







2021 · Short Documentary 25 minutes · English · Amy Grappell

Kinderland tells the story of two secular Jewish summer camps in upstate New York that have cultivated social activists for almost a century and are still in existence today. Both camps were founded by secular working-class Jews on either side of the leftist political divide. Kinderland was communist; Kinder Ring (The Workmen's Circle) socialist. Despite numerous commonalities, they enjoyed a legendary feud from opposite ends of Sylvan Lake. In response to the devastating impact of the Trump era and the accompanying rise in intolerance and inequality, today's campers, a largely secular multi-ethnic group, prioritize shared values over philosophical differences and attempt to join forces in the ongoing fight for equality and justice.

What makes *Kinderland* exceptional and timely is that it presents a history of political consciousness in America, while highlighting the ongoing re-emergence of critical social issues and the ways divisiveness is a primary impediment to establishing real and permanent change.

Amy Grappell Director/Producer


Amy Grappel's documentary short *Quadrangle* premiered at Sundance in 2010, where it won a Jury Prize. It went on to win Best Short Film at SXSW, AFI, Dallas International Film Festival, and had its New York premiere at New Directors/New Films, before being broadcast on HBO. Grappell returned to Sundance in 2011 with her short documentary Kids Green the World. She was one of the select writer/directors on Richard Linklater's Slacker remake (2011), and her feature documentary Light From the East, shot in Ukraine during the fall of Communism, premiered at SXSW and aired on PBS affiliate KLRU (2009). Grappell is the recipient of grants from The Austin Film Society, the National Endowment for the Arts, the Texas Council for the Humanities and The Puffin Foundation.



For a considerable period, I carried this family story, yet I remained distant from it, unwilling to fully engage. Growing up in a family that refrained from acknowledging trauma, I was repeatedly urged to "move on" and avoid dwelling on painful experiences. This perspective, undoubtedly empowering and fostering resilience, allowed me to navigate life actively and persevere. However, while adhering to this mindset, I unknowingly concealed parts of myself—parts that would occasionally emerge unexpectedly, catching me off guard and deviating from my intended path.

One such concealed aspect is my second name, Ada. I never truly delved into the reasons behind this name, choosing instead to hide it as it felt unfamiliar and outdated. But today, after completing this film and discovering that I was named after a baby girl who tragically perished in the Holocaust, I proudly embrace it.

Roma, homosexuals, communists, and artists were all persecuted under the Nazi regime. 

From the Director

I met Roman Vishniac's daughter, Mara Vishniac Kohn, over twenty years ago at a lecture of Elie Wiesel in Santa Barbara, my hometown. Mara recounted the story of her childhood in Berlin and her family's frantic, eleventh-hour escape from Nazi Germany. Her vivid description, through a child's eyes, was as enthralling as the story itself. She invited me to her home, a mid-century modern museum of treasures from a distant time and continent, perched atop Santa Barbara and a huge expanse of the Pacific. Her father's photographs, hung on the walls, were vaguely familiar to me from the coffee table book in my father's den. When she opened a closet of prints and negatives, a large portfolio case fell out, with photographs of Albert Einstein. This was my first real introduction to Roman Vishniac. As a creator of black-and-white photographs, I was blown away by the images: the emotional response they elicited; the feeling of peering into a sacred time capsule, a visceral portal into Jewish history to marvel at faces and places that are long gone.

There had not been a comprehensive film made about Vishniac. Mara, his sole heir, was not interested. "It's complicated. I don't want to get into all of that," she said. After many meetings, I convinced her that this would be a way to bring the photographs to many more people, another generation, and that it would be possible and worthwhile to tell the story of a man who was both gifted and complicated. He didn't need to be a hero.

Mara and I worked together over three years until her passing at the age of 92. We developed a close friendship. What emerged was a fascinating portrait of a gifted artist and his family navigating the storm of 20th century Europe and their own family saga; a complex and flawed persona who made incredibly significant contributions to the collective memory of our history and culture; and a daughter who gracefully overcame challenges with her father in order to embrace her inheritance and preserve his legacy.

As I pored over a hard drive of prints and negatives of Vishniac's work – over 23,000 items – I began to grasp what set him apart. Vishniac was passionate about finding beauty through careful observation of individuals and communities. It could be boys studying in a cheder in Mukachevo, a dragonfly on a leaf, or plankton he found in pond water. but there is a unifying fascination about all living things coupled with a complete passion for his subjects. He was in love. It is easy to see how this passion colored not just his art but his life where he was often dramatic. grandiose, overexaggerated.

Vishniac's singular obsession with the microscopic world guided how he approached all of his subjects: "The closer you get, the more beautiful it is," he often told Mara. This closeness and affection can be seen in the faces he captured for posterity. In many of these photos, the subject peers directly at Vishniac.

There is a rapport, a connection, a momentary intimacy between photographer and subject that

somehow captures their human essence. This is the magic of Vishniac and what I hope to bring to the screen – the beauty, majesty and wonder of a world Vishniac spent his life seeking out and documenting on film.



Laura BialisDirector/Producer

Laura Bialis is an award-winning documentary filmmaker. Her most recent film. Rock in the Red Zone (2015) is a personal view from the ground in Sderot, Israel, and an exploration into the lives of musicians creating in a conflict zone. The film was screened in over 80 cities worldwide. Bialis directed and produced the critically acclaimed documentary *Refusenik* (2007) a seminal film about the movement to free Soviet Jews, which was released theatrically in fifteen cities, broadcast on Israeli television, and was released on Netflix. Other projects include View From the Bridge: Stories From Kosovo (2008) and Tak For Alt (1998), the story of Holocaust survivor turned Civil Rights activist Judy Meisel, which was honored by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, broadcast on PBS. and has been used extensively in high schools across the United States for Holocaust education. Laura holds a B.A. in

History from Stanford University,

and an M.F.A. in Production from the USC School of Cinema Arts.

Executive Producer

Producer Nancy Spielberg grew up immersed in filmmaking, working on her brother's early films as cast and crew. She attended Arizona State University and UCLA and, after moving to New York in 1978, studied film at Sarah Lawrence College and the New School. An accomplished businesswoman and philanthropist, she has turned her energy and talents to producing documentary and feature films. One of her priorities is to help preserve stories and make them into educational tools for the benefit of younger generations.

Nancy Spielberg is founder and co-founder of several charities including "Children of Chernobyl," "Project Sunshine" and the American branch of The Jerusalem Academy of Music and Dance. She is also involved in charities that help victims of terror and support soup kitchens.

Excerpted from an interview with Gad Elmaleh

Q: The film is about your relationship with the Jewish faith and your deep affection for Mary, but it is also a film about identity, and yours is definitely multiple—

A: Yes, it's a film about identity in the broadest sense. In it, I am asking myself and with great sincerity, about my place, as a 50-year-old man, in society, in my family, in the world, in geography, in history, in my history, in my relationship to Jewishness. As I said, I've been talking about the same things for thirty years, except that now I think I'm talking about them with more courage, without hiding behind an artifice. It's like returning to my first love. If you only knew how much I took out during editing: the gags, the grimace! There is humor in the film, but the humor arises naturally from situations, it's not forced. I use the situation, but not so much for the comic effect as for the reflection it can provoke in everyone.

Q: What did you enjoy most?

A: Getting the non-actors to act was the most overwhelming and most rewarding aspect. I didn't want to make characters out of my mother, my sister, the priests, or the rabbis. I wanted us to be above clichés. I wanted to involve people who are themselves, whereas in the film I don't really know who I am anymore.

Q: Your emotion is evident.

A: Yes, because it's the film I'm most proud of. The film has a path and I too have a path. I think the film will start a discussion, and I'm happy to be able to start a discussion with the audience members who want it. I think it's quite an unsettling film, and I realize that it's a huge luxury to tackle the subjects you really want to talk about. I want to learn, and we learn a lot from others and from the faith of others. The sentence of Monsignor Lustiger that I put at the end of the film sums up my path as well: to go and see very far, to go and look very far in order to embrace what one is deeply.

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
