Completed Artwork & Artist Statement Deadline: August 23

Completed artwork must be returned and artist statements submitted by August 23. Please complete your artist statement at **MayersonJCC.org/UnderOneRoof.**

Also, submit your supply receipts via email or with your artwork for reimbursement (up to \$50). Please label any physical receipts with your name.

Photos will be taken of your artwork for publicity and archival purposes. Artwork and artist statements turned in after August 23 are not guaranteed to not be included in our artist booklet or exhibit.

Exhibition Dates: October 16 - 30

The Sukkah Art Show, *Luminosity*, will be on display in the community sukkah* in the Mayerson JCC courtyard. It is free and open to the public during JCC business hours.

Art Reception: October 21 at 6pm

Enjoy an evening with community, art, and food as we celebrate the festival of Sukkot*. Visit the Under One Roof reception between 6 - 8pm to enjoy a nosh, artwork, and conversation. Multimedia panels from nearly fifty community participants exploring this year's theme, *Luminosity*, will be highlighted.

^{*}This art exhibit is in celebration of Sukkot, the Jewish harvest festival. Sukkot is observed by building a temporary dwelling called a sukkah and focuses on welcoming quests, caring for the environment, and taking time to be joyful.

CREATING YOUR MASTERPIECE

Design your canvas to reflect your interpretation of the theme, *Luminosity*.

The artworks in the 2024 Under One Roof exhibit will explore the brilliance of light all around us. We have arrived at this theme from diverse points of inspiration:

We have had many themes permeate our exhibit which always create thought-provoking conversations with compelling artworks from across the community year after year. When we look inside ourselves and bring those thoughts and feelings outward, that contemplation coming together from different perspectives creates an interlacing of ideas, thoughts, and truths for us as individuals and as a community. The artworks in the 2024 Under One Roof exhibit will explore the ways in which light impacts our lives.

From the beginning of time — when G-d said, "Let there be Light!" to how luminescence influences and inspires us — light has been an enduring symbol in Judaism. The Proverbs teach, "A mitzvah is a candle, and the Torah is light." Further, we fulfill the idea of celebrating rituals with beauty, Hiddur Mitzvah, by adorning the walls of our sukkah with the exquisite artworks created by Under One Roof participants.

As we take in the radiance of the stars in the night sky above our sukkah, the artworks in the 2024 Under One Roof exhibit will explore the brilliance of light all around us.

What brings light to your life? How can we aspire to make the world a better and brighter place? Discovering meaning on our journey, we treasure the luminescence around us, wherever it may come from.

This theme is intentionally open-ended. We look forward to your creativity!

If artwork does not follow the guidelines or is deemed inappropriate, the Mayerson JCC reserves the right to not display artwork, at its discretion.

Art Guidelines:

You may use any medium to decorate your canvas (see the adjacent Helpful Tips page for ideas), but be aware of the weight of the piece and the fact that it must withstand the elements.

The orientation of the canvas – portrait or landscape – is up to you. On the back, please indicate the top of the piece, so it can be hung correctly.

Please also put your name on the reverse side, lower left corner of your canvas. This will help us keep track of your art.

Please coat both sides of your canvas well with Mod Podge or another acrylic sealant to protect it from the weather, especially if gluing photos or paper. These artworks will be displayed inside our sukkah, which stands outdoors in the JCC Courtyard. Canvas panels will be exposed to the elements.

Do not put your logo or name on the front of your canvas. The JCC will create identification placards to hang next to each canvas that will recognize the participant, share your Artist Statement, and a brief description of your organization (if applicable).

You will be reimbursed up to \$50 for materials. Don't forget to save your receipts and submit them (labeled with your name) with your completed canvas. As a nonprofit organization, we are unable to reimburse for tax charges.

HELPFUL TIPS AND TRICKS

Over the years, we've discovered some tips & tricks to help you along the way.

All mediums look great on the canvas, but we've found that canvases that include heavier materials, such as found objects, can prevent appropriate hanging. September/October can be a rainy time of year. Please coat both sides of your canvas with Mod Podge or an acrylic sealant to protect the images from the weather.

These materials work well on your canvas:

- Acrylic paints
- Permanent markers
- Paint markers
- Fabric paints or markers
- Thread
- Puffy Paint
- Photo transfer fabric

Consider using hot glue to adhere the following:

- Sequins
- Gemstones
- Fabric

- Felt
- Ribbon

WHAT IS SUKKOT?

Sukkot, the fall harvest festival, is named after the booths or huts in which Jews are supposed to "live" during this week-long holiday. The booths are a physical reminder of the flimsy houses in which the Israelites lived during the 40-year journey through the desert toward the land of Israel. Eating and living in this temporary structure – called a sukkah – helps people focus on the important things in life and helps one separate from material possessions. Because Sukkot is also a harvest festival, it is considered an especially happy and festive time.

Sukkot begins five days after Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement. **This** year, sukkot is celebrated from sundown on Wednesday evening, October 16 - 23, 2024.

A sukkah is a temporary structure with at least three sides and a roof made of thatch or branches. The roof should provide some shade or protection from the sun, but still allow you to see the stars at night. A sukkah can be built out of wood, fabric, tarps, metal, or anything else you happen to have lying around the house. Traditionally, the sukkah is decorated with everything from posters to gourds to paper chains. Meals are eaten in the sukkah (weather permitting) and many people choose to sleep there, too.

The lulav (a bundle of willow, palm, and myrtle branches) and **etrog** (a citrus fruit that looks similar to a lemon) are ritual objects that are used only during Sukkot. Held together, the lulav and etrog are waved in the four directions while reciting a special blessing. The act represents, among other things, life, rebirth, and respect for the earth.
